

The summer series ends on August 3 with **Southpaw Stance**, returning from last summer's series.


Tim Connors has taken over management of the series, which promises to be one of the best yet.

SAYING FAREWELL TO OLD FRIENDS

Quentin E. Valkema (1930-2017) Long-time Lincoln-Douglas Society Board of Directors member Quentin E. Valkema passed away March 6, 2017 in Freeport. Quent was known to the Society Board as Mr. Music, both for his long-time work with the Freeport Concert Band, as well as his coordinating the musical programs that were often part of events commemorating the Lincoln-Douglas Debates. Both for the 1994 C-SPAN re-enactment of the Debate and the 2008 Sesquicentennial events, Quent handled all the arrangements for bringing the First Brigade Band to Freeport. The First Brigade Band is a Civil War re-enactment musical organization. The performances and period balls played by that group were significant enhancements to the festivities and Quent took great pleasure in being involved. Quent was also a collector of Lincoln artifacts and enjoyed sharing his vast collection with friends.

Brooks Davis (1926-2016) For decades John Brooks Davis was for decades an active member and officer of The Stephen A. Douglas Association. He passed away on Oct. 29, 2016, in Marion, Illinois. For the 2008 Lincoln-Douglas Debate Sesquicentennial he was the official representative of The Stephen A. Douglas Association during the Freeport events. The photo of Books here was taken during the Freeport parade in 2008. Books had an abiding passion for history, speaking on Abraham Lincoln and the Civil War across the country. He also spoke about his distant cousin, Jefferson Davis, who was guarded by Brooks' grandfather at Fortress Monroe after the war. He served as the president of several organizations such as the Sons of Union Veterans and the Civil War Round Table.

SIGN RENOVATIONS

This spring the Society undertook the renovation of the two cedar signs which welcome visitors to Debate Square. The one at Douglas Street and State Avenue was repainted while the one on Clark was remade due to deterioration.

The Clark Street sign was originally donated by the Freeport Womans Club and was much older than the one on Douglas. The small plaque denoting the donation has been place on the new sign.

The total cost for the renovation / replacement was over \$5,000. Donations are being accepted to help cover the costs.



Medford / Sokup Lecture, continued from page 1...

Edna Greene Medford is Professor, current Chair, and former director of the Department of History's graduate and undergraduate programs at Howard University, Washington DC. Specializing in nineteenth century African-American history, she teaches courses in the Jacksonian Era, Civil War and Reconstruction, as well as African-American History to 1877.

Dr. Medford was educated at Hampton Institute (now Hampton University) in Virginia, the University of Illinois (Urbana), and the University of Maryland (College Park), where she received her Ph.D. in United States history. She lectures widely to scholarly and community-based groups and has presented to national and international audiences on topics that range from Alexis de Tocqueville's influence on American politics to community-building among American free blacks in Civil War-era Canada, to African-American responses to Abraham Lincoln's wartime policies.

Dr. Medford has served as the Director for History of New York's African Burial Ground Project and edited the volume *Historical Per*-



spectives of the African Burial Ground: New York Blacks and the Diaspora (volume 3 of the series, The New York African Burial Ground: Unearthing the African Presence in Colonial New York) history report. She has published numerous articles and book chapters on African Americans, especially during the era of the Civil War. Her publications include the co-authored The Emancipation Proclamation: Three Views (2006). She compiled and wrote the introductions to the edited two-volume work The Price of Freedom: Slavery and the Civil War - Volume I, and The Price of Freedom: Slavery and the Civil War - Volume II. In 2015 her book Lincoln and Emancipation was published.

Dr. Medford has served as a faculty mentor to the Ronald McNair Scholars since 1998, and she has been the faculty sponsor for the campus chapter of Phi Alpha Theta History Honor Society for 24 years. She is a former member of the Board of Trustees of National History Day, Inc., a member of the Executive Committee of the Lincoln Forum, and chairperson of the Scholars Advisory Council at President Lincoln's Cottage at the Armed Services Retirement Home in Washington, DC. She serves on the board of the Lincoln Bicentennial Foundation, the Ulysses S. Grant Association, the Lincoln Studies Center at Knox College (Galesburg, Illinois), and the Abraham Lincoln Institute. Dr. Medford is a 2009 special bicentennial recipient of the Order of Lincoln, an award given by the state of Illinois, for her scholarship on the Sixteenth President.
